Welcome to the **cbm** New Zealand Impact Report for 2024.

We give thanks to God once again for a year of hard work from a great team to achieve our mission aims in tandem with our overseas partners and our wonderful supporters in New Zealand who give sacrificially. What big hearts!

We were successful with funding bids through the Aotearoa New Zealand Cooperation programme, managed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT), for Papua New Guinea (including for earthquake and flood responses) and the Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh. OUR WORK

DISABILITY PREVENTION

2,465,808 people reached to help prevent Neglected Tropical Diseases

Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) affect communities in Nigeria in multiple ways. Diseases like Lymphatic Filariasis (Elephantiasis) and Onchocerciasis (River Blindness), lead to long-term suffering, pain, and disability. When affected people can't work or go to school, it reduces income and limits opportunities for families and communities. The diseases lead to long term suffering, pain and disability, reinforcing widespread poverty.

cbm has supported Nigeria's government to control the spread of NTDs, particularly those that can lead to visual and mobility impairments. **cbm's** long term programme has contributed to the elimination of Onchocerciasis (River Blindness) and Lymphatic Filariasis (Elephantiasis) in some countries. Efforts in mass drug administration, better sanitation, and education campaigns for improved hygiene practices have resulted in reduced transmission.

In 2024, the project also provided support to people who have already been infected by NTDs with surgical interventions and rehabilitation to improve dignity, mobility and quality of life. People living with more advanced stages of Lymphatic Filariasis (Elephantiasis) have received treatment through delivery of limb care management and psychosocial support.

The project has also ensured that local partners have been able to strengthen the government health system. Local capacity has been developed for disease control strategies, drug management and distribution, early identification of disease conditions and treatment registration and reporting.

Over three phases, this project has significantly reduced the burden of these debilitating NTDs on individuals and communities.

Good health and clean water go hand in hand. So having access to clean water from well-maintained boreholes in Nigeria, helps free children and adults from contracting Neglected Tropical Diseases like River Blindness.

Women and children spend many hours walking to the river to gather muddied and contaminated water, but thanks to generous people like you, they now have access to clean fresh water from well-maintained boreholes.



WATER , SANITATION & HYGIENE (WASH) IN NIGERIA

Around the world, there are millions of people who do not have access to fresh clean water. **cbm's** Water, Sanitation and Hygiene project (WASH) focuses on delivering clean water and good sanitation practices to communities to prevent Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) from taking hold again.

Having access to clean water from well-maintained boreholes helps free communities from contracting NTDs. It also means children and adults no longer need to spend many hours walking to the river to gather muddied and contaminated water.

Fresh clean water helps keep people healthy. And healthy people are more productive, able to access education and employment, and have a far greater chance of breaking the cycle of poverty and disability.

Clean water from boreholes is vital to a community, but many existing boreholes have stopped functioning for various reasons. They are often broken and in need of urgent repair due to their age.

One very important aspect of **cbm's** WASH programme is training local people to repair broken wells. As a result of this practical training, people in remote communities, including people with disabilities, now have access to fresh clean water from their newly refurbished boreholes.

Thanks to generous people like you, new or refurbished boreholes are available to people in remote areas, providing an easy-to-reach source of fresh clean water. And adding wheelchair ramps helps make gathering water safer and more accessible for people with disabilities. Thank you for your support.

OUR WORK

HEALTH SERVICES

- 56,886** people accessed health services, comprising:
- 33,715** people screened for eye disease
 - 14,651** people screened for ear and hearing care
 - 8,520** people screened for physical, mental health and other medical conditions
- 19,441** people received medical treatment, comprising:
- 13,003** people treated for blinding diseases
 - 5,661** people received cataract operations
 - 6,216** people treated for ear and hearing care and other medical conditions

In addition to the figures above, 13,961 people were supported to access mainstream medical services through improved referral pathways, and 3,938 life-changing assistive devices were fitted across different **cbm** programmes.

With your generous support, **cbm**-funded programmes helped ensure that people with disabilities were included and had access to life-changing surgeries for eye health, ear and hearing care, obstetric fistula, and orthopaedic conditions such as clubfoot, unset fractures and bone infections, as well as providing rehabilitation services and psychosocial support as required.

MEDICAL TRAINING - UPSKILLING OF HEALTH PROFESSIONALS

In 2024, **cbm** supported training of 6,862 health workers. In Papua New Guinea our **cbm** Senior Ophthalmologist, with over 30 years of experience working in low and middle income countries, trained a local eye nurse who will be working in a new eye service in a neighbouring province with high rates of avoidable blindness. After bringing eight ex-patriate eye doctors to work in Papua New Guinea over the years, we are pleased to report that our **cbm** partner has recruited a full-time locally trained ophthalmologist.

SIGHT-SAVING CATARACT SURGERY IN ZIMBABWE

Stellar is in her eighties, and even in her advancing years, she loves to be productive – toiling on rough ground in remote eastern Zimbabwe, growing maize for her family to provide a little income. Hard, endless work, but Stellar loves being useful and productive.

Being useful and productive hasn't always been possible for Stellar due to her eyes misting over with blinding cataracts – until she could no longer even see the food on her plate.

Cataracts sometimes grow slowly. But not for Stellar. The veil over her eyes fell quickly, until even by peering closely, she could no longer work. "It was hard to tell the weeds from the maize plant," she lamented.

Her independence faded quickly, just like her sight. She could no longer grow her own food or earn an income. Her blindness even made it too dangerous to walk alone. If she fell, there was no medical care to help with broken bones or wounds that could bring life-threatening infection.

Stellar had no choice but to move in with her relatives. They fed her, bathed her, guided her to walk, and even helped her to use the bathroom. It saddened Stellar that she needed more care than even the youngest child.

The family didn't mind though. They love Stellar, and wanted to help her, but her need for constant care took them away from their own economic needs, cutting into their working hours. This is how disabilities, like blindness from cataracts, make poverty even worse for families in the world's poorest places.

"I cannot do anything for myself," she grieved. "I used to fetch water. I used to sell my garden produce. I can't do it anymore. I miss it. I spend the day just sitting."

But thanks to generous people like you, a **cbm**-funded field worker found Stellar in her remote village and shared the good news that in just 12 minutes of surgery, provided free of charge by faithful and kind-hearted people, her days of darkness would end.

Stellar was beside herself with astonishment. "I will be able to see again! I am overjoyed! I did not know or think that my condition could be cured!"

After Stellar's sight-saving surgery, when her bandages were removed, she cried out in happiness, "Everything looks so clear!"

The surgeon asked, "How many fingers am I raising?"

"Four!" Stellar happily replied. "Thank you God!"

OBSTETRIC FISTULA SURGERY IN NIGERIA

Few people in New Zealand know how debilitating living with obstetric fistula is: how a mother can go for years, decades, even a lifetime – constantly cleaning and wrapping herself, separating herself from society, because she cannot stop her body from leaking its waste.

Thanks to wonderful support like yours, mothers like Jamila are receiving a gift greater than they could ask or imagine. Jamila received the skillful surgical support and loving aftercare that gave her freedom from obstetric fistula!

Obstetric fistula only really affects mothers' lives in places of extreme poverty, where there are virtually no resources for maternal healthcare. Nigeria is one of the ten most dangerous places for a mother to give birth. Of the more than one hundred thousand cases of obstetric fistula every year, forty thousand will occur in Nigeria.

Jamila did at least have a hospital to go to for the birth of her second baby. However, when she experienced a third-degree tear in childbirth, she only received basic surface stitches. No-one realised how deeply the tear had wounded her.

Bodily waste from an obstetric fistula started leaking through her birth canal. She was deeply shocked and utterly mortified.

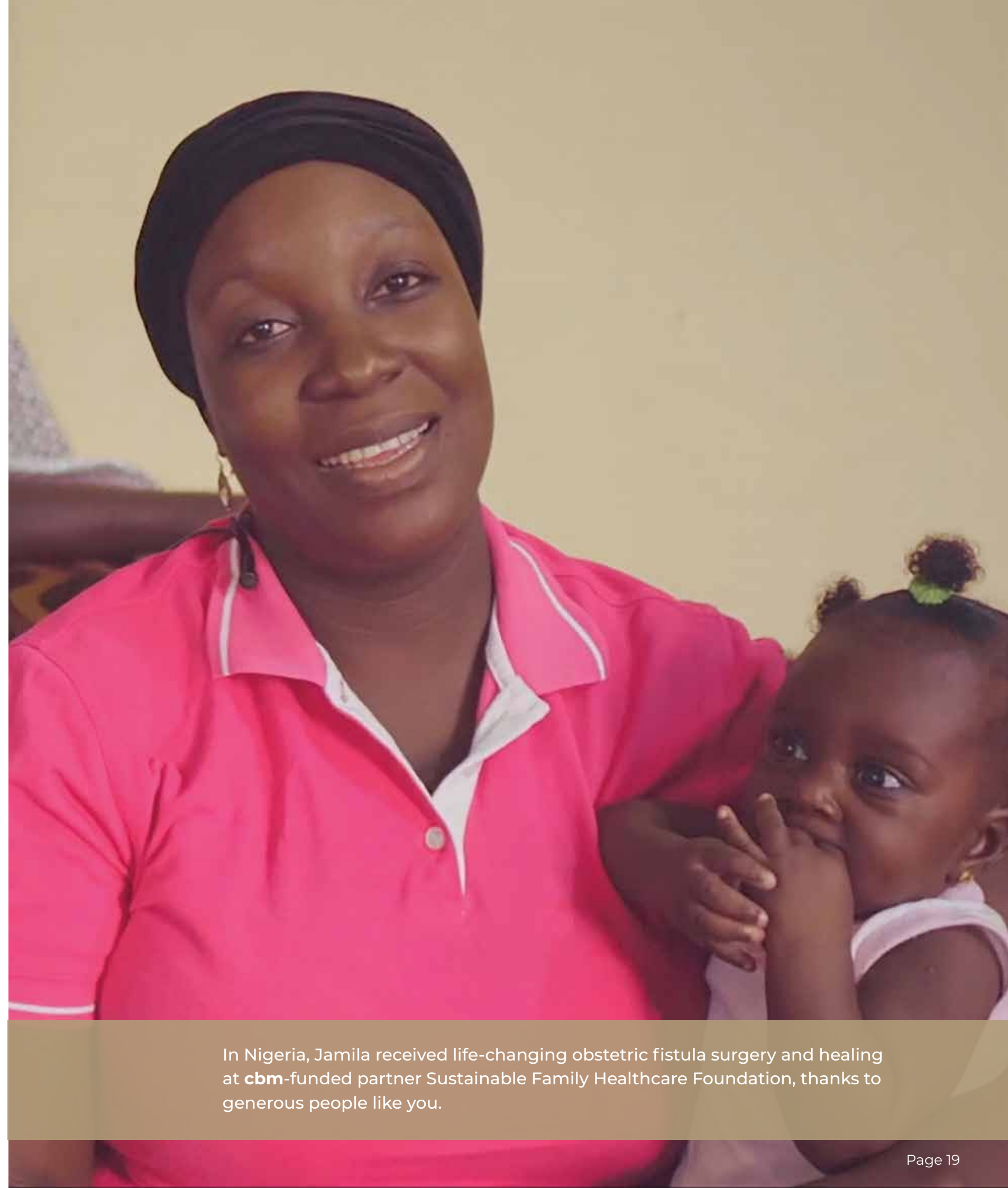
Imagine Jamila's future without the support of generous people like you. She would live trapped in her room, unable to go to work, to the market or to church, because it would be impossible to hide her overpowering smell. Without surgery the leaking would never stop.

The **cbm**-funded partner Sustainable Family Healthcare Foundation is the ministry that cared for Jamila. "They were such a blessing and the surgery was successfully done," she says, beaming with a smile so broad and joyful. "I'm out of that terrible experience!"

Likewise, her husband's eyes light up as he too delights in the great gift you have given to his precious wife. Her husband says, "I was touched by what was happening there. We are grateful and we pray that Almighty God will keep on strengthening this organisation to do more and more, so that the lives of others will be touched."

We are grateful to God too – especially for people like you. Without you, there can be no **cbm**, no expert help for mothers suffering this humiliating disability. It is a rare person who even knows about obstetric fistula in our time.

PHYSICAL REHABILITATION IN NEPAL

Just like any 7-year-old girl, Kajal comes up with an exciting new dream just about every day! Sometimes she wants to become a doctor and some days she wants to join the police.

But as her father Babulal knows only too well – without life-changing surgery – her severe bow legs will limit her dreams.

And unfortunately, Kajal is not the only one in her family who knows first-hand the pain and prejudice of living with severe bow legs.

Her father Babulal was born with the same condition. And Kajal's 5-year-old brother, Omkar, too. In fact, this hereditary condition has affected this family for generations.

As Babulal says, "My father and I have the same condition as my children. But because of poverty and our poor economic condition we couldn't have treatment and it is too late."

Babulal shares how he felt when he found out both his children had bow legs too... "I was heartbroken because I have already faced the same issue. The pain, the stigma that's attached and will follow... I suffer a lot by seeing their struggle."

You can imagine how heart wrenching it must be for Babulal to watch his precious children growing up with this debilitating condition, knowing full well what their future holds.

Living in a remote region of Nepal where treatment for conditions like bow legs isn't readily available, the family couldn't afford the surgery themselves.

Despite his own pain, Babulal works hard selling crops, doing everything he can just to put food on the table for his family.

As you can imagine, there is simply no extra money to pay for specialist medical treatment like the surgery Kajal and Omkar need.

In cases like this, it's important children are able to access life-changing surgery, before it's too late.

But thanks to generous people like you, Kajal and Omkar received the life-changing surgery, rehabilitation and physiotherapy they needed for their severe bow legs. Their lives are completely transformed.

CHILD SPONSORSHIP

Gum was born with severe knock knees, in the heart of a poor community in Uganda's bustling capital city Kampala. He is a much-loved younger son to his mother Aciro.

His mother first noticed his legs were bending inwards when he was just a baby. She felt helpless as she didn't know where to turn for help, and hoped that it would go away as he grew, but it never did.

Gum's condition limited his interactions with other children, and he was unable to attend school with his peers. He often watched the other children as they left for school, wishing he could join them. But his knock-knees made it difficult for him to walk long distances, let alone attend school.

It broke his mother's heart to see him struggle each day, and she wished she could afford the surgery so that he could then attend school.

Thanks to generous people like you, there was hope for Gum.

At the hospital called CoRSU – for Comprehensive Rehabilitation Services for People with Disability in Uganda – the lives of thousands of children like Gum are changed. It is an amazing oasis of healing... warm welcome... and world-class care.

The generous gifts regularly given, make this wonderful work possible.

Gum spent two weeks at CoRSU. The surgical team focused intently on a fascinating procedure. Small metal plates were fixed onto Gum's leg bones, to slowly bring his knees into alignment over time. The operation was a great success.

Aciro's joy was overwhelming! She is so grateful to people like you. "I know this came from God," she said, adding: "I want to thank those people for what they have done. The mockery and laughing will stop. We shall live in peace."

Gum has returned to CoRSU several times, for rehabilitation to strengthen leg muscles; release tightness; and improve his gait.

Mum says, "Before ... the other children didn't want to play with him. Now it's 'come and play football.'"

Best of all, Gum can now go to school. Mum said, "I can hardly believe it. He's a different boy. His head is high and he is very tall."

Thank you for helping make impossible dreams come true.

BRINGING VISION WITHIN REACH: A PARTNERSHIP CHANGING LIVES IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA

In Papua New Guinea, long- and short-sightedness are among the leading causes of avoidable blindness. Without something as simple as a pair of glasses, daily life can become a struggle: children fall behind in school, roads become more dangerous, livelihoods disappear, and independence slips away.

To address this, **cbm** has partnered with the OneSight EssilorLuxottica Foundation to expand access to quality vision care. Through this collaboration, local nursing staff are being trained to deliver eye screenings and refraction services, bringing long-term capability into the country's health system.

One of the first to benefit is 72-year-old Simon, from a remote village in the Eastern Highlands.

For 25 years, Simon worked as a truck driver. It wasn't just a job – it was his way of providing for his family and earning respect in his community. But in his mid-fifties, his vision began to fail. Driving became unsafe. Eventually, he had to give up his work. The loss of income, daily purpose, and human connection left him increasingly isolated.

Simon's journey to care was far from easy.

In a place where terrain is harsh and roads are limited, accessing an eye clinic meant arranging a two-way journey by 4WD vehicle – a trip few in his position could manage.

But at a new community eye clinic supported by **cbm**, and strengthened through OneSight Foundation's technical assistance, Simon finally found help. His eyesight was assessed, and he was prescribed glasses with different strengths in each eye, something that standard reading glasses couldn't address.

Thanks to the Ready-to-Clip glasses, Simon was able to receive a customised solution on the spot. For the first time in years, he could see clearly again.

His face lit up. "I will drive again," he said, with pure happiness.

Through this partnership, thousands more Papua New Guineans, especially in remote areas, will be able to access glasses that can restore not just sight, but dignity, livelihood, and connection.

OUR WORK EDUCATION & EMPOWERMENT

5,340 people empowered through development programmes, comprising:

1,663 people supported to access education services

1,923 people participated in peer support / self-help groups including 1,121 people with disabilities

1,227 people supported in economic empowerment and sustainable livelihoods

527 teachers received education-related training

Community Based Inclusive Development (CBID) is a ministry that ensures people with disabilities are respected and included in their communities on an equal basis in all areas of life. This approach is people centred, community driven and human rights based.

INCLUSIVE LIVELIHOODS

For people with disabilities, earning an income is empowering, bringing the respect of others, including the respect of their families, and it also enables other opportunities. In 2024, **cbm** worked in Laos and the Solomon Islands assisting people with disabilities to gain access to vocational training and employment.

Empowering people with disabilities through economic opportunities in these programmes, enables more participation in community life and steps towards economic independence. Through these programmes, people with disabilities and vulnerable groups build sustainable livelihood opportunities and are empowered to access their human rights for health care, rehabilitation, clean water, sanitation and hygiene. The local **cbm**-funded partners aim to create accessible and inclusive environments that support small home-based businesses, with training and skills development, and links to markets. For individuals with disabilities, this is especially important to ensure they have equal access to opportunities and resources as any other member of the community. The programmes foster positive attitudes towards people with disabilities and create opportunities for social interaction within the communities. By having a sustainable livelihood, people living in remote or rural communities have experienced improved health, greater access to education, and an overall sense of well-being.

Georgine has been attending school at one of the nine **cbm**-funded Competence Centres in Madagascar, to learn braille and access the standard curriculum thanks to the support of generous people like you.



INCLUSIVE EDUCATION

Generous support like yours, to the **cbm**-funded KoloHay Inclusive Education Programme, continues to provide children with visual or hearing impairment with quality education in 7 regions of Madagascar. In 2024, this project supported 9 Competence Centres (4 schools for the blind and 5 schools for the deaf). Every staff member is fluent in sign language or can transcribe braille, so that they can provide more in-depth support to the learners.

All students who are supported by the **cbm**-funded programme receive all services free of charge: including school fees, school supplies, boarding, and food costs, access to medical screening and further treatment as required.

Additionally, the Competence Centres have a close relationship with mainstream schools, also supporting them to deliver inclusive education for students with visual or hearing impairment – through the training of teachers, provision of educational materials which serve as learning aid tools, and accessibility refurbishments. In 2024 the programme worked with 78 mainstream schools which enrolled 536 students with visual or hearing impairment.

INCLUSIVE LIVELIHOODS IN LAOS

Thongphet has a physical disability that impacts his ability to walk and has faced many challenges in providing for his family. Through **cbm**-funded projects in rural communities of Luang Prabang, he is one of 4,076 people that have directly benefited from this project which is funded by **cbm** supporters and our Government's Aotearoa New Zealand International Development Cooperation Programme.

Thongphet received three goats and helps care for his sister's goats as well – creating a sustainable source of income. With nine goat kids born and five sold, the money has been used for food, healthcare, and his children's education. He proudly shares that his children are thriving in school!

To support people with disabilities to participate in livelihoods, a health and rehabilitation needs assessment was conducted with each person across 20 villages. Based on this assessment, 65 people like Thongphet were supported to access health services including assistive devices, ear and eye treatment, and ongoing support. Now, 121 households have had accessible toilets constructed and 474 households were reached with hygiene and sanitation awareness.

Kindness from people like you ensures that Thongphet's goats receive regular care from a district agricultural officer. It also enables him to receive training in animal husbandry, financial management, and disability rights – empowering him to actively participate in village meetings and community life. Because of this vital support, Thongphet now looks forward to the future with hope – for himself, his family, and his community.

HUMANITARIAN ACTION

16,820 people assisted in emergencies with humanitarian support including 3,513 people with disabilities

INCLUSIVE HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT IN THE PACIFIC

cbm has been supporting disability inclusive humanitarian action in the Pacific through a partnership with Pacific Disability Forum that focuses on three Pacific countries; Tonga, Samoa, and Cook Islands. Across these countries, **cbm** supports eight different Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs). Disaster resource teams are now established within the OPDs, so that inclusive strategies are supported in plans of the national emergency response teams. This is so that any emergency response, whether in preparation for natural disasters, providing immediate assistance, or recovery efforts later, can be inclusive and accessible for people with disabilities.

RESPONSE TO TROPICAL CYCLONE TRAMI (KRISTINE) IN THE PHILIPPINES

Severe tropical storm Trami (or local name; Kristine) moved through parts of the West Philippines in October 2024. Over 160 cities and municipalities were declared under a State of Emergency, with widespread flooding, power outages, and water supply interruptions. There were over 178 fatalities.

In November 2024, **cbm** joined efforts for an inclusive humanitarian response plan for people with disabilities and other vulnerable sectors in the hardest hit municipalities in the provinces of Albay, Catanduanes and Camarines Sur in Bicol region.

Humanitarian response activities include the provision of multi-purpose cash grants, provision of assistive devices and rehabilitation services, as well as mental health and psychosocial training, along with support services in affected communities. This project continues into 2025, aiming to meet the priority needs of about 1,700 typhoon-affected households (approximately 8,500 individuals) experiencing poverty and social exclusion.

RECOVERY AND RESILIENCE IN SOUTH MADAGASCAR

Madagascar ranks 172nd in the 2024 Human Development Report, with 76% of the population living below the poverty line. Communities face recurrent humanitarian crises caused by climate change, with tropical storms, seasonal flooding and drought sadly common. From an agricultural perspective, soil fertility is deteriorating and rainfall variability is increasingly disrupting agricultural calendars.

This **cbm** humanitarian response project supports the training of individuals, families and households, on risk and disaster management. Six Farmer Field Schools were operationalised in 2024 to support individuals and households to not only maintain sufficient produce for self-consumption, but also ensure the ability to sustain a livelihood via selling at the local market.

This project also enables advocacy, awareness and support for Organisations of Persons with Disabilities (OPDs) so that they have a voice at the national level to ensure long-term humanitarian recovery for people with disabilities.

RESPONSE TO EARTHQUAKE AND FLOODING IN PAPUA NEW GUINEA

Near the beginning of 2024, torrential rains combined with strong winds triggered widespread flooding and landslides in the provinces of East Sepik and Chimbu in Papua New Guinea. A 6.9 magnitude earthquake further exacerbated the impacts. Redeploying a number of personnel and services that **cbm** already supported in the region, **cbm** was able to provide life-saving essentials following these natural disasters by extending health and disabilities services to impacted regions, including the provision of funds to help build back livelihoods. Over 1,000 people were supported to access health services to screen for eye and ear diseases, and given medical clinical treatment, with over 250 people referred to local health and rehabilitation services for further support. Additionally, nearly 200 hygiene kits were provided to impacted families. In 2024, over 8,500 people had already been provided with essential assistance, and by the conclusion of this project in April 2025, over 17,500 vulnerable people will have been provided with essential assistance.



cbm seconded Ear Nose Throat (ENT) specialist Dr Mary Ponifasio, coordinated a team of local health professionals to conduct medical outreach camps to remote locations affected by the earthquakes and mudslides in Chimbu and East Sepik, PNG.

PROVISION OF REHABILITATION SERVICES FOR ROHINGYA REFUGEES IN BANGLADESH

In 2017, over one million Rohingya fled Myanmar, settling and finding refuge in Bangladesh's Cox's Bazar. Initially there were no services for refugees with pre-existing disabilities, those who acquired traumatic injuries prior to, and during, their journey to Bangladesh, and those who developed medical conditions or disabilities since arriving in the refugee camps. Seeing this need, **cbm** has been supporting disability inclusion services in the camps since 2018. In 2024, **cbm** support focused on the provision of rehabilitation services across a number of camps; provision of assistive devices and referrals for health services, and informing communities about the needs of people with disabilities to increase awareness and participation of people with disabilities – both within the camps and the local communities living alongside the camps. In 2024, rehabilitation services such as Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, and Speech Language Therapy were provided to 2,239 people. 768 people received vision and hearing screening services, while 523 assistive/ therapeutic devices (such as crutches, wheelchairs, glasses and hearing aids) were provided to 494 people.

In Ukhiya Upazila, Cox's Bazar District, people with disabilities continued to be excluded from social, economic, and educational opportunities. They lacked awareness of their rights, and had limited access to support services. Opportunities to voice their opinions in social forums and spaces were also rare, where they often endured negative perceptions from the community.

To help address this, the **cbm**-funded Centre for Disability in Development (CDD) engaged with people with disabilities to support the formation of Self-Help Groups (SHGs). The aim was to help people with disabilities to unite, claim their rights, allow access to resources, and drive positive change. Several people with disabilities in the Ratnapalang Ward reached out to CDD, expressing their willingness to form SHGs. CDD organised a meeting and brought together people with disabilities, community members, and local leaders. A management committee was also formed to ensure the effective leadership and smooth operation of the groups. Meeting monthly, the SHGs served as regular gatherings to discuss personal and collective issues, as well as awareness sessions aimed at increasing the understanding of rights, advocacy, accessibility, and inclusion. Additionally, skill development training has been offered to these groups.

The establishment of these SHGs has significantly transformed the community's approach to disability inclusion. Key achievements include empowerment and participation, with members discussing challenges, and learning how to ensure inclusion in community discussions, such as preparing for a disaster. Advocacy success has also been evident, as the groups work to promote disability rights and collaborate with local government around developing policies for inclusion. Moreover, members actively assist in obtaining Citizen Cards and Disability Allowance Cards for people with disabilities, improving access to essential services. Finally, the groups' efforts have fostered greater community acceptance and reduced stigma surrounding people with disabilities.

LIFE-CHANGING SUPPORT FOR ROHINGYA REFUGEES

Seven years ago, Abdu arrived in the camps with his wife and six children. He was also accompanied by his mother and a brother, with many family members being left behind (but who have since arrived over the last 4 years). Abdu has also fathered another child since being in the camp.

When he lived in Myanmar he led an active life of playing sports and spending time outdoors with his children.

This changed when he was held in detention by authorities in Myanmar. Injuries from this period have resulted in muscle and neurological damage, as well as ongoing back and leg pain.

Abdu's injuries led to challenges with being able to grip or hold anything, as well as issues with walking and balance, and toileting himself.

It was only after hearing about the services of **cbm** and the Centre for Disability in Development (CDD) that he was able to make his way to the clinic to be assessed for long overdue treatment and support. This assessment of therapeutic support was delivered by mobile health providers at the Primary Health Care Centre and hospital of the International Federation of the Red Cross & Red Crescent Societies (IFRC)/ Bangladesh Red Crescent Society (BDRCS).

There he has received physiotherapy for pain, and has also learnt some self-care therapy that he can do at home. His pain has reduced, and his mobility has increased, and he is able to take care of himself including washing, which means he needs less support from his family.

He has a renewed sense of independence, and is able to walk with his children to the learning centres, as well as teach them things when out in the community.

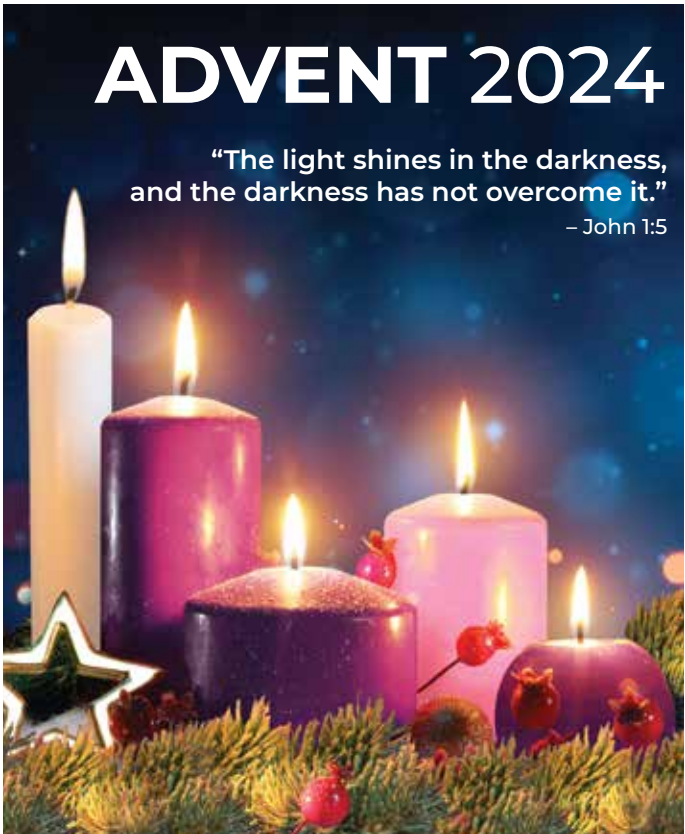
ADVENT
